From the Well is Cork County Library and Arts Service's most enduring and popular annual short story publication. The 2022 collection is the 18th edition in the series and features the best original short stories submitted by adult writers who are registered Library members. The 2022 editor is the respected author Denyse Woods.







In 2021 he became the first Irish writer to be awarded the Jean Monnet Prize for European Literature. His work has been adapted for stage and screen and translated into over twenty languages. His seventh book, *The Queen of Dirt Island*, was published by Doubleday in August 2022 and was an instant number one bestseller.





Submit & Subscribe to Southword

Southword: New International Writing is a print literary journal published twice a year by the Munster Literature Centre. Southword has published the likes of Medbh McGuckian, Helen Ivory, Haruki Murakami, James Lasdun, Kim Addonizio, Tess Gallagher, Colm Tóibín and Vona Groarke. Our spring issue is composed of prizewinning and shortlisted entries from our Gregory O'Donoghue International Poetry Competition and Seán Ó Faoláin International Short Story Competition, as well as specially commissioned work. Unsolicited submissions of poetry and short fiction (for our autumn 2023 issue) are open as follows. POETRY: December 1st, 2022–February 28th, 2023. FICTION: January 1st–March 31st, 2023.

Karina Tynan



Two Frank O'Connor Interviews

Writers of Today

Designed to explore the important literary expressions of outstanding contemporary authors, *Writers of Today* is a series of filmed interviews with novelists, poets, and dramatists. The interviews concentrate on the goals, abilities, and preferences of the writers, their reasons for writing, how and what they write, and the background

and environmental influences on their particular modes of expression. In this half-hour interview from 1957, Walter Kerr discusses the more subtle differences between the novel and the short story with Frank O'Connor.

Monitor Interview

This 1961 clip from the BBC arts magazine programme 'Monitor' shows the author talking to presenter Huw Wheldon about his upbringing in Cork's 'slums' and how it led to his development as a writer. It also features picturesque views of Cork. "It's in the provinces, it's in a city like this, that character is shaped and, up to a certain point, character is all that matters. After that, individuality has to take over and somehow or other the man's full individuality has to be expressed," O'Connor says. "[If I hadn't left Cork] I'm quite certain that I wouldn't have been the writer I am, whatever that may be, but I think there's a strong possibility that if I hadn't been brought up in Cork I wouldn't have been a writer at all."



Jānis Joņevs & Daina Tabūna





Daina Tabūna (1985) is a Latvian prose writer. Her short story collection *Pirmā reize (The First Time)* was shortlisted for the Annual Latvian Literary Award 2014 as the best debut of the year and was widely acclaimed. It is a contemporary coming-of-age book addressing sensitive issues of acquiring experience and forming as a personality. Tabūna's stories have been published in the UK

by The Emma Press, bearing the title *The Secret Box*. The illustrated collection features three stories from her debut *The First Time*. Tabūna's works have also been translated in Lithuanian, Slovenian, German, and Chinese. Currently she is working on a novel, and her first children's book will be published soon.





An event to mark the publication of **Art Imitating Life Imitating Death** (an exploration of *Guests Of The Nation* by Frank O'Connor) by Cónal Creedon.

In 2003, Cónal Creedon was commissioned by RTÉ to adapt *Guests of the Nation* for radio as part of the Frank O'Connor Centenary Celebrations. "I was seduced by a narrative so deeply rooted in a culture, history and landscape so familiar to me, I became captivated by this wartime parable." So began Cónal's personal journey to the soul of O'Connor's story. It was a voyage of discovery that led him on a circuitous route to the Irish War of Independence, and the execution of Major Compton Smith on a hillside bog in Donoughmore County Cork. IRISHTOWN PRESS welcome you to join Cónal on his personal journey – into a world where the visceral reality of Irish War of Independence IRA safe-houses dovetails delicately with the fiction of Frank O'Connor. Cónal first presented this lecture at the James Joyce Foundation, Swiss Centre of Irish Studies at University of Zurich Jan 24th 2020. It was subsequently published by *Studi irlandesi*, A Journal of Irish Studies at the Florence University Press.






The Seán Ó Faoláin Prize is awarded to the best single story entered in competition from anywhere in the world. The first prize is €2000. The winner also receives a week's residency at the Anam Cara artist retreat in West Cork and publication of their winning story in Southword. This occasion is an opportunity to hear the 2022 winning story "Infestato" by E.M. Hughes.

E.M. Hughes is a writer and editor making a living offering communications advice in the public and voluntary sector. Having previously worked in grocery stores, pubs, hotels, bookstores, call centres and banks in five different countries, he is happy to earn his keep writing under other people's names - but happiest when writing under his own. His articles have appeared in the *Berkeley* Political Review, The Daily Californian, and the Newsletter of the European Union and the Montesquieu Instituut. Hughes resides in Utrecht with his wife and newborn and is completing a collection of stories about working life.



The AKO Caine Prize for African Writing is a literature prize awarded to an African writer of a short story published in English. The Prize was launched in 2000 to encourage and highlight the richness and diversity of African writing by bringing it to a wider audience internationally. The focus on the short story reflects the contemporary development of the African storytelling tradition.








